

JUSTICE IN THE HALLS OF MEDICINE:

In keeping with a practice of publishing a book each year, Dr. E. Gaylon McCollough is pleased to announce the release of his provocative new novel: *JUSTICE IN THE HALLS OF MEDICINE*. The story has a local flavor, in that much of the action takes place in Alabama, particularly along the Gulf Coast. JUSTICE IN THE HALLS OF MEDICINE takes readers behind the scenes in the medical profession where good and evil vie for the minds, bodies and souls of human beings, and where Mediocrity looks upon Exceptionalism as an archenemy that must be toppled.

When asked about his latest novel, Dr. McCollough said, "I wanted to give the public a "cradle to grave" picture of what goes into a physician's training, the issues that doctors and nurses deal with in their professional and private lives, and how the healthcare industry is being manipulated by politicians, corporations, and investors. I like to believe that *JUSTICE IN THE HALLS OF MEDICINE* delivers that message in an informative—and entertaining—manner."

The Gulf Shores surgeon went on to say that with the future of America's health resting squarely in the hands of the U.S. Supreme Court, healthcare is a topic on everyone's mind. The effects of poor health—and poor healthcare administration—are far reaching. And people from a variety of backgrounds

are tampering with how to fix what is *wrong*, some without fully understanding what is *right* with the current system ... or foreseeing the consequences of politically-charged "change."

Dr. McCollough added, "If you look up the meaning of the word 'doctor' in the dictionary, you'll find that it means 'teacher.' That's why I feel an obligation to devote the time I'm not directly caring for patients to write books that are intended to enlighten as well as to entertain," he added. "It is another way I can use what I've learned and experienced to inform an anxious public about ways to enhance their lives—things they won't read in most newspapers or see on the big four television networks."
